We're next to the Swimmer Monument near Dover Harbor.

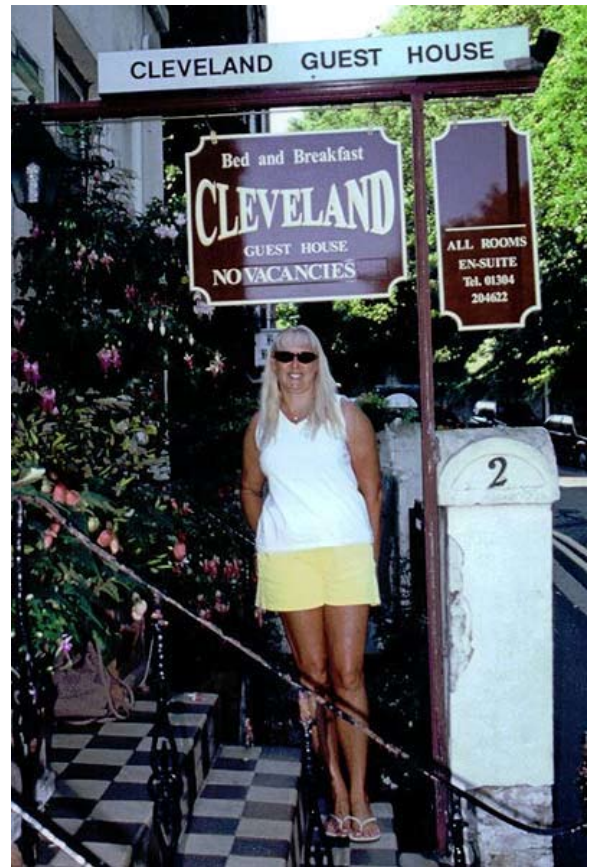


Marcy and I are standing by the Matthew Webb Monument, also near Dover Harbor.

Many of these ferries passed me during my swim on their way back and forth between Dover and Calais.



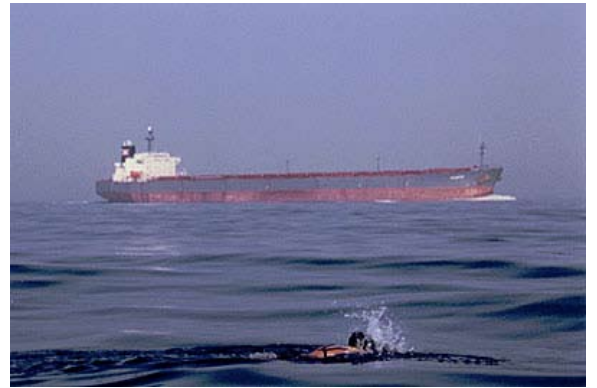
I'm swimming along close to my escort boat.
